1. Introduction and Executive Summary

1.1 CHAIR'S STATEMENT

The Serendip charity was formed 11 years ago (Both in the UK and in Sri Lanka) in response to an urgent need created by a civil war on the island of Sri Lanka. The Serendip Children's Charity is a UK Registered Charity (Number 1133461). A group of us came together after observing a violent conflict which left in its aftermath, around eighty thousand widows, a similar number of orphans and numerous physical disabilities because of military action. We have come a long way from these dark times, but there is still much more to be done.

Our first project was named 'Care in the Community'. It was to help the children who lost both or one of their parents in the war. We decided to sponsor such children by matching them up with appropriate sponsors in the UK. With the money raised we initially supplied food to their families and later helped pay for their educational materials.



We now employ our own field workers to help deliver our projects. We have expanded our activities to support nursing and vocational training for young adults and a variety of fine art's projects. These include learning musical instruments, painting, and handicraft, help to special needs children, and supporting children with terminal illnesses. We are also helping women headed families with livelihood projects e.g seed money for small businesses, yoga for young people at school, supporting students at open university, and digging tube wells. So many different disciplines, so many projects!

Last year we identified that children with special needs are a seriously neglected section of the population. This year, following our earlier sponsorship that sent teachers to undertake specialised training in India, we have begun to see the long-term benefits. The knowledge gained is now being passed to a far wider circle of teaching staff in schools' special needs units. We now also employ therapists to work with such children in those units. They lead speech, art, and music & dance therapy classes. They also run sensory rooms, yoga sessions, and much more, in our existing Fine Arts centres (which we physically run).

Many rural children have to go to school without breakfast. This will impact their ability to learn and develop while at school. To help combat this problem we significantly extended our existing 'Breakfast for Kids' project. After doing so we have seen an increase in school attendance and an improvement in their performance and physical development.

One further overlooked group in society are our elders. Devoid of a regular income, often lonely and abandoned by their families, they struggle to survive their daily life. To make their lives a little easier we have begun supplying dry food, medicine, and some basic clothing on a regular basis.

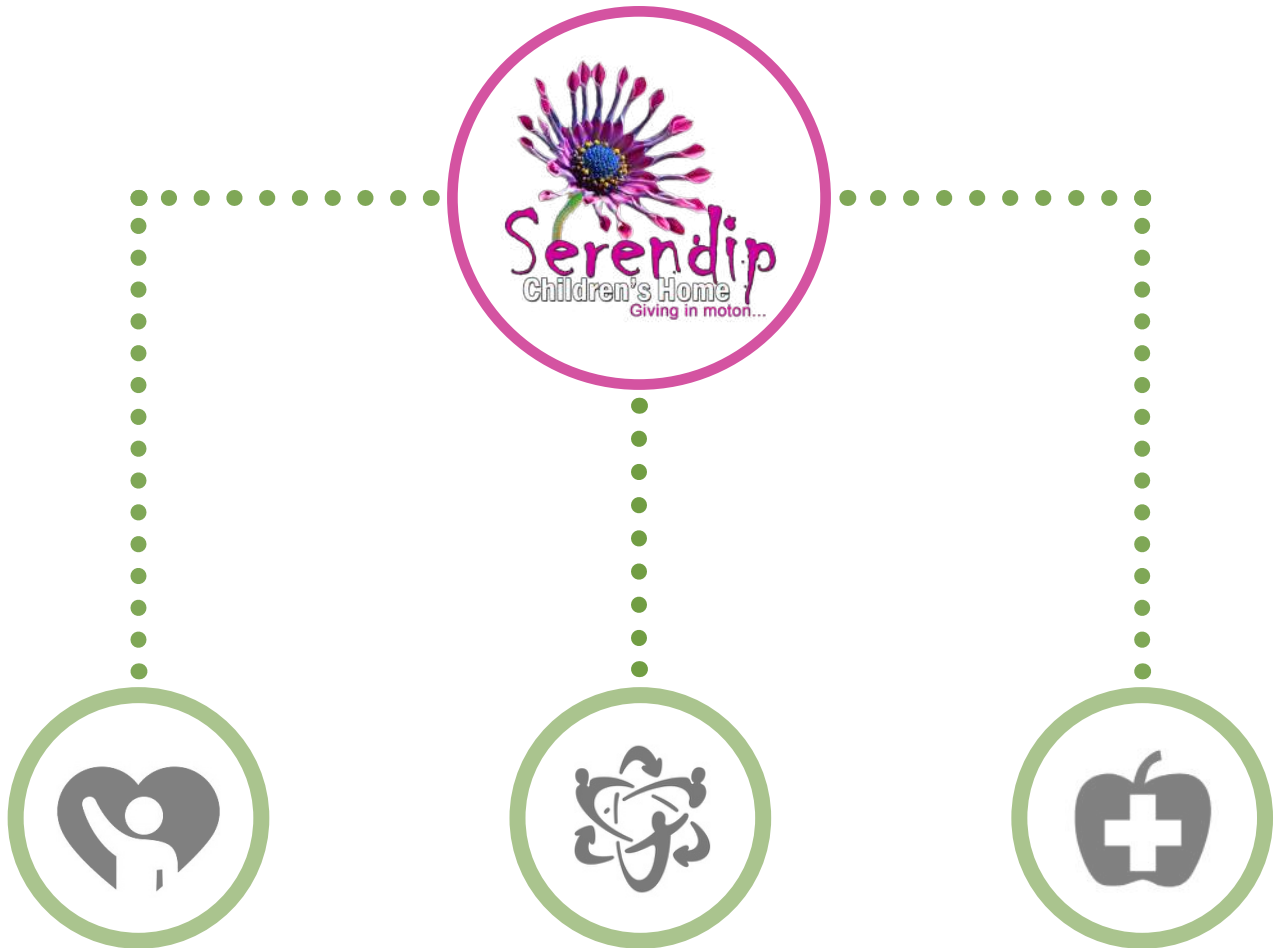
Finally, as with most of the world, Sri Lanka has struggled with COVID-19 and, inevitably, the poorest and most geographically desolate, have struggled to obtain their basic necessities. In June, we started providing food parcels, that would last for a minimum of two weeks. The situation is still unsettled and there have been multiple regional lock downs, thus we feel we need to maintain this support.

For the forthcoming year, for obvious reasons, our current projects will need to be maintained. Whilst rolling out food parcels to rural villagers, as part of our COVID-19 relief program, we became aware that families with special needs children are facing a systemic problem. Namely, given the 24-hour care, now required for their children, it is not possible for these families to earn a living. Thus, next year we are expanding our livelihood program i.e. start-up small businesses, to help such families generate their own income.

While we can call ourselves fortunate living in a country with all the wealth and freedom it offers, we must not forget that there are many areas of the world, including in the north & east of Sri Lanka, that are struggling to meet their basic necessities of life. I believe we have a moral duty to think of those less fortunate individuals and how we can help them.

Assistance to orphaned and vulnerable children in Sri Lanka by supporting them in a loving and nurturing home, addressing their immediate needs of food and shelter and their progressive needs for education, social support and eventually, work and independence.

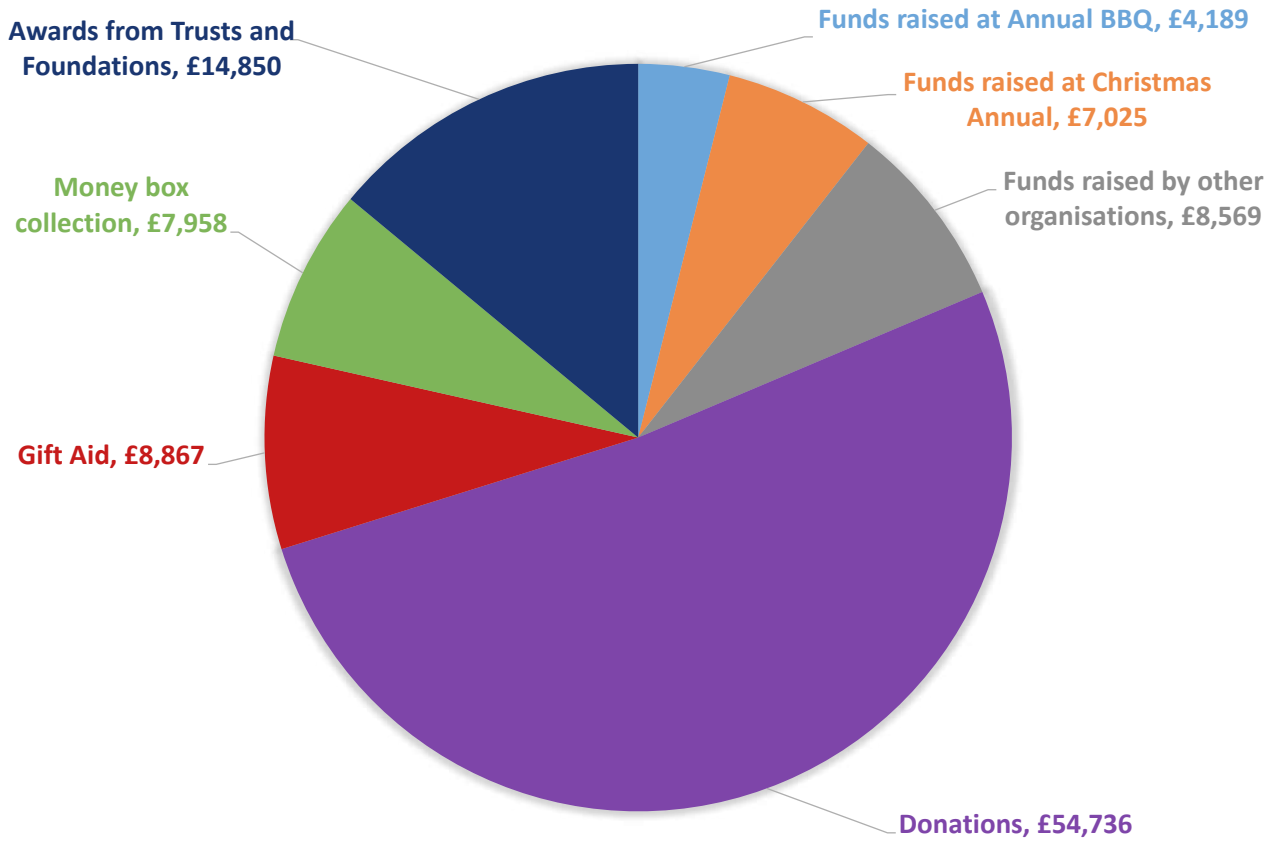




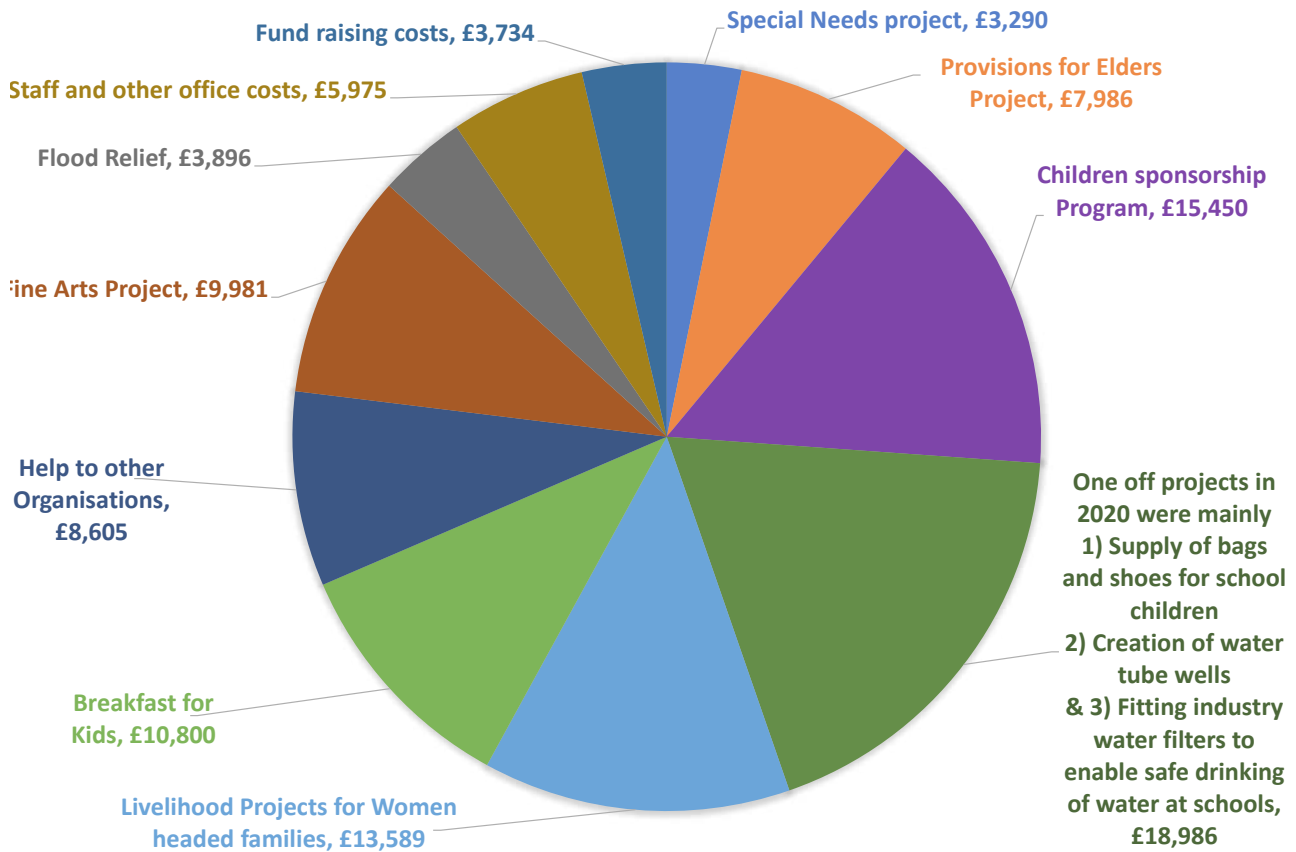
2.2 KEY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

In 2021, we will build upon the success of 2020 and will broaden the geographic area and number of beneficiaries of our existing projects. For example, although we are providing group therapy to children with special needs, especially young autistic people, we are planning to expand this to provide a tailored therapies to individual children. In addition, we will be adding one new goal.



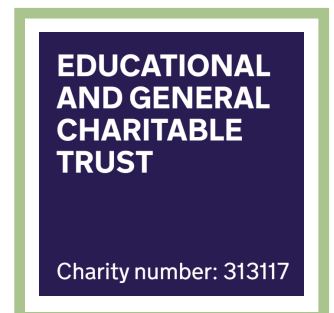
In addition to our three Main Objectives from 2020, we will be adding a fourth objective:- 'Education of Nurses'. We aim to focus on existing societal demands. For example, there are insufficient numbers of qualified nurses in the north of Sri Lanka. Thus, we are planning to support twenty-five young girls from underprivileged background to enrol on Diplomas in Nursing.

In addition, we are keen to maintain some flexibility to respond to emergency needs. For example, we have already supported families affected by COVID-19. Sri Lanka often suffers from serious flooding and we wish to provide the necessary support, as and when required. This also means, we will continue to offer one-off support upon request e.g. tube wells, school equipment etc.

Every £1 you donate will be put to great use in 2021 to help the most needy and vulnerable. Below are some examples on how every £1 helps.

1. Breakfast for Children

Around 2 years ago, Serendip Children's Home, launched the Breakfast Project to ensure that the most vulnerable children in rural areas of North Sri Lanka, receive a breakfast each and every pre-school day. So far, we are providing breakfast for 400 pre-school children in 20 schools.

- Feeding 1 child costs as little as £1 per week.
- Feeding 1 child costs £48 per year.



2. Assisting Special Needs Children

Serendip provides specialist facilities, therapy and equipment to schools in the North and East of Sri Lanka to support children with special needs and autistic children. This includes sensory rooms, speech & language therapy, yoga sessions, and also music & dance therapy in our fine arts centres.

- A speech therapist costs £150 per month, totalling £1800 per annum.

3. Provisions for Elders Project

The Provisions for Elders Project seeks to help 1186 elders in villages in the districts of Mullithivu, Kilinochchi, Vavuniya and Jaffna. Elderly individuals are provided with at least two meals per day, medicines, medical care, bedding, basic clothing and transport to attend medical appointments.

- Just £8 will feed an elderly person for one month.
- Just £96 per year will feed 1 elderly person for the full year.

6.2 VOLUNTEER YOUR TIME TO HELP THE CHARITY

We are a small charity run by friendly volunteers across all ages from university students to retired people. We are always looking for caring, passionate people who can contribute with ideas and time for our fund-raising activities, organising sponsored events as well as helping to communicate with our donors.

We normally meet once a month via video-conference to update each other on the progress of our projects, fund-raising activities and the events we organise.
